

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

March 20, 2026



Good Morning!

I am pleased to announce that Broadview Heights has again been named as the #1 Safest City in Ohio, an honor bestowed upon us multiple times in the past decade, including 2024, 2020, 2016, and 2014. Even more impressive is that we were named in the Top 10 list of safest cities in the U.S. multiple times, including 8th this year, 7th in 2019, and 5th in 2016. I am honored to work with Police Chief Don Polick and all of the officers working on behalf of all of us in the police department. If you've ever had the need to contact them for assistance or have interacted with them at Safety Town, DARE Graduation, parades, etc., you are well aware that the designation of being the safest city in Ohio is because of their dedication to keeping us protected. I'd also like to thank the people in this community for their vigilance in looking out for their neighbors and contacting the police department when something looks questionable. All of us working together is exactly why we consistently rank at the state level and nationally for our safety statistics. Thank you to everyone for their diligence in keeping Broadview Heights a great place to live, work, and raise a family!

As we enter the third week of Women's History Month, I'd like to highlight a community member who has contributed a great deal to this city, Louise Fiszer. As early as 1975, Louise was the City Clerk under Mayor Donald Faulhaber, Sr. Starting in 1980, she worked as a Financial Counselor at Ohio State University, assisting her clients with budgeting and other financial issues for fifteen years. In addition, from 1982-2016, Louise worked in the U.S. Department of the Navy, as a Processor of future naval officers. She recruited and completely prepared each person for Military Officer Candidate School, which required six months of prep for each individual. When she retired from there a decade ago, Louise went to work at Danbury Senior Living, working part-time at the reception desk, but also tapping into a long history of caring for others by assisting residents in the Independent Living, Assisted Living, and Memory Care areas. Not surprisingly, she formed strong bonds with the clients' families, providing comfort or whatever help they needed.

Louise Fiszler's volunteerism through the years is also quite impressive. She has been closely involved with national organizations such as the Red Cross and the Girl Scouts (as a Brownie and Cadet leader), as well as giving her time and sharing her talents with the Bittersweet Estates Condo Association as their President, a member of the Broadview Heights Lions and Broadview Heights Boosters, a volunteer at the "Bloodview" haunted house, and an officer (Secretary, Treasurer, current President) for the BVH Historical Society. Thank you, Louise, for over fifty years of impressive service to our community and to all the people whose lives you've touched through the years!

In closing, this week's classroom quote is from an impressive woman whose story actually began as a teenager in Pakistan. Then 15-year-old Malala Yousafzai was on her way home from school in October of 2012 when a masked Taliban gunman boarded her school bus and asked, "Who is Malala?" Upon locating her, he proceeded to shoot her in the left side of her head. After waking up 10 days later in a hospital in England, the medical staff told her about the attack and shared with her that people around the entire world were praying for her recovery. Her injuries required months of surgeries and rehabilitation.

An outspoken proponent of the importance of an education for girls, her criticism of the Taliban's restrictions on women were viewed as being pro-Western and an anti-Islamic threat to their control, thus making her a target they wanted to silence. Malala blogged about the hardships of living under Taliban control, and her activism was viewed as a threat to the Taliban's survival.


The quote from Malala that illustrates the importance of speaking up about the necessity of an education for everyone, as well as rebelling against the loss of our freedom to write about and inform others of discriminatory practices, especially for women, is, "So let us wage a global struggle against illiteracy, poverty and terrorism and let us pick up our books and pens. They are our most powerful weapons".

When asked in 2014 why she continued to risk death and speak out on behalf of girls' education after the attempt on her life, she said, "I had really two options. One was to remain silent and wait to be killed. And then the second was to speak up and then be killed. And I chose the second one, because I didn't want to face the terrorism forever. And I wanted to come out of the terrible situation. And I wanted to go to school. It was my love for education that encouraged me to continue the campaign. So, I think, in hard times, we need to raise up our voice. Otherwise, we will have to live in that terrible situation forever". Eventually, Malala Yousafzai became a symbol of peace and education throughout the world, becoming the youngest-ever Nobel Peace Prize laureate. She is truly a role model for all of the young girls in the world today and I applaud her courage.

SUMMER SERVICE DEPARTMENT WORKERS Assist the Service Department in landscaping, grounds keeping and related duties for City projects and Parks maintenance. LIFEGUARD Guard our indoor pools, lazy river and play feature. Work approximately 15-24 hours/week. Work is primarily Monday – Friday, DAYSHIFT and/or EARLY MORNING OPENER. Must be interested in working year-round, this is not a seasonal position. Must be at least 15 years of age and with certification as a Lifeguard.

SUMMER LIFEGUARD Work approximately 15 hours/week, guarding our indoor pools, lazy river and play feature, and at our outdoor Splash Park. If interested, may be able to keep working at our indoor facility year-round. Must be at least 16 years of age and with certification as a Lifeguard.

CONCESSIONS STAND WORKER Provides food and beverage services at seasonal concessions stands, including filling orders, preparing food, handling cash, set-up and clean-up duties. Works part-time, including evening and weekend hours at games, through the summer recreation season. Requires strong customer service skills, the ability to operate food service equipment and a cash register, make correct change and lift up to 25 lbs.

WATER SLIDE/SPLASH PARK ATTENDANT Work part time during afternoons, evenings and weekends, 15 - 25 hours/week at our Splash Park and/or Indoor Pool Slide to make sure patrons use the facilities safely. Must be at least 15 years old, have good communications skills and ability to earn CPR/AED certification (we provide CPR/AED training).

CATCH BASIN UPKEEP

Catch basins collect storm water and release it into the municipal storm sewer system. Regular clearing improves drainage and helps to prevent flooding. Remember as you are maintaining your yards, to clear any leaves and debris so that rain water and melting snow can drain properly.

ENBRIDGE GAS OHIO EAST WALLINGS ROAD GAS LINE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

Enbridge Gas Ohio will be replacing the gas mainline between Broadview Road & Skyline Drive. The project is expected to begin 1-26-2026 and reach substantial completion 5-29-2026.
